WORKS IN PROGRESS

Apocalyptic Praxis for a Climate-Changed Planet (book manuscript, three of eight chapters drafted)

Abstract: Discourse about climate change often veers toward the apocalyptic, and uses the intensity of this strange, dangerous language to goad emergency action. Yet this intensity often has unexpected consequences as some respond by simply throwing up their hands in resignation to the dawning reality that there is nothing we can do. My book engages this whiplash of agency to suggest that apocalyptic praxis—modes of living forged in the ending of worlds—offers tools and resources for enabling meaningful, creaturely agency in the Anthropocene. These practices are already present in climate justice movements, and this book curates these repertoires to inspire hope in divine and creaturely action.
